POST: Roundtable on „Partnerships for sustainable development: searching for theoretical and methodological perspectives“

The Partnerships Orchestrating Sustainability Transformations (POST) is a project of a team from the [EELISA](#) in collaboration with Scuola Normale Superiore Florence and Universidad Politécnica de Madrid dedicated to understanding cross-sector partnerships for sustainability transformations through exploring its meaning, dimensions, context, and nature.

POST will organize 3 distinct activities between January 2023 – April 2023:

1. *Workshop 1, Roundtable & Research visit (Hybrid; Led by Scuola Normale Superiore in Florence)*
2. *Workshop 2 & Research visit (Hybrid; Led by Universidad Politécnica de Madrid in Madrid)*
3. *Spring School (in-person; Led by FAU in Nürnberg)*

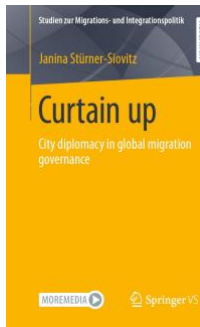

Janina Stürner-Siovtz: „Curtain up! City diplomacy in global migration governance”

Curtain up explores city diplomacy in global migration governance. The author lays out the paradox that cities, although increasingly de facto migration actors in an urbanizing world, lack channels to influence international policies that directly impact local realities. Drawing on ten case studies from around the world, the author shows that local governments strive to overcome this paradox through global-level interaction with national and international actors contributing to the emergence of a role of cities in global migration governance. Cities draw on this role to influence migration narratives, place local issues on global agendas and demand a seat at decision-making tables. Advancing the analysis of cities as global-level actors, the author introduces role theory to migration studies and presents a series of timely policy recommendations. These set out concrete steps towards a stronger institutionalization of city diplomacy in global migration governance.

In 2018, cities from Africa, Europe, North, and South America officially submitted input to the state-led negotiations of the Global Compact for Migration. In the same year, the Mayors Mechanism was established within the Global Forum on Migration and Development, and in 2019, cities made pledges to localize the Global Compact on Refugees. At first sight, this engagement seems surprising, given that migration and displacement are mostly areas of national decision making. How, then, did it become possible for cities to claim a role in global migration governance? And how do cities attempt to play this role? While cities as integration actors have received growing academic attention, it is time to focus on city agency in global migration governance. To explore this phenomenon, this article introduces role theory to research on city diplomacy in migration studies. The analysis shows that the combination of the globalized representation of migration challenges (linking the local and global levels), the glocal role claimed by cities, and the passive role attributed to nation-states can empower cities to demand an active role in global migration governance. Cities draw on this role to promote three forms of city diplomacy as adequate and feasible actions on the global stage: advocating for rights-based migration policies; striving to gain access to international funding and cooperation partners; and demanding a seat at intergovernmental negotiation tables. In closing, the article reflects on the risks and constraints of city diplomacy in global migration governance and shows directions for future research.

„Wir müssen mehr reguläre Einwanderungswege schaffen“

Interview mit Prof. Dr. Petra Bendel in BWP – auch als Podcast abrufbar

Zur Deckung des Fachkräftebedarfs ist Deutschland auf Einwanderung angewiesen. Bereits in den vergangenen Jahren wurden gesetzliche Änderungen und Regelungen geschaffen, die den Zuzug von Fachkräften erleichtern sollten – zuletzt das 2020 in Kraft getretene Fachkräfteeinwanderungsgesetz. Doch erzielen sie die gewünschte Wirkung?

Bei der Frage, wie die Zuwanderung nach Deutschland gesteuert werden soll, geht es nicht allein um eine rein quantitative Passung von Fachkräftenachfrage und -angebot. Weitere Fragen spielen eine Rolle: Wie können wir die weltweite Erwerbsmigration fair und gerecht gestalten? Wie können Kompetenzen und Qualifikationen der Zugewanderten adäquat bewertet und ihre Potenziale genutzt werden? Und wie kann ihre Integration im Einwanderungsland Deutschland gelingen?
